

Watauga LEAD's goal is to reduce harm, empower individuals, and improve public safety by connecting community members at risk of justice system involvement with services, support, and compassion, and to provide local law enforcement, stakeholders, and individuals with tools, training, and resources as alternatives to arrest and/or incarceration.

Watauga LEAD is a pre-arrest diversion program serving community members at-risk of justice system involvement through peer support, case management, clinical services, financial sponsorship for supportive housing, transportation, and harm reduction supplies.





ROI offers support and resources free of charge and judgment to anyone experiencing substance use or mental health challenges while incarcerated at the Watauga County **Detention Center.** Our services are client-led and client-driven. We help clients identify their own goals and work towards achieving them together.




The Mediation and Restorative Justice Center operated Recovery Court in Madison, Yancey, Avery, Mitchell, and Watauga Counties.

OVERDOSE RESPONSE & PREVENTION

Basic harm reduction and safer use information. Overdose reversal training, Narcan and fentanyl test strips included. Coed. Led by staff.

I LOVE YOU BUT NOT YOUR ADDICTION

A support group for any person struggling with the challenges of a family member or friend with substance use disorder. Coed. Led by Dale Hudler, LEAD Case Manager.

SEEKING STRENGTH

Seeking Strength is a group for women who have experienced trauma, substance use and/or Post Traumatic Stress Disorder. This group focuses on teaching safe coping skills in the present for general wellbeing and development of coping skills while connecting with other women in the community. Seeking Strength is a free group for women, led weekly by our ROI Peer Support Specialist Pam Greer.

SMART RECOVERY

SMART Recovery is a global community of mutual-support groups. At meetings, participants help one another resolve problems with any addiction (to alcohol and other drugs or to activities such as gambling or over-eating). Participants find and develop the power within themselves to change and lead fulfilling and balances lives guided by a science-based 4-Point Program. This is a free coed support group led weekly by Certified Smart Recovery Facilitator Ken Connelly.

<u>NEW IN 2024</u>

WISH YOU WERE HERE

Wish You Were Here is a support group for anyone who has been affected by grief. This group is open and uses book work, open discussion, and activities to help members navigate the complexities of grief. The group focuses on "normalizing" life again, reintegration, and healing from loss.

Wish You Were Here will meet Monday nights at 6:30pm beginning February 5th and is free and open to the public. This group is lead by our Recovery Court Advocate Melissa Monday, a certified grief group facilitator.
