
Recovery on the Inside is a postarrest and pre-trial diversion program located within the Watauga County Detention Center.

Watauga LEAD is a pre-arrest diversion program offering peer support, case management, clinical services, outreach, advocacy and transportation.

PEER SERVICES

Peer Services are open to anyone in the community, regardless of participation in other more intensive programming and provides a supportive space to meet basic needs and work toward achieving wellness and recovery goals.

- Basic supplies includes clothing, food, hygiene, and harm reduction supplies.


Reentry FRUICE STATION


REENTRY SERVICE STATION Est. 2023

The Reentry Service Station is a workforce development program that assists people reentering the community after a period of incarceration or other gap in employment and works across all HRC programming.

STABLE Workplaces is a new initiative in Watauga County, led by AppHealthCare, designed to create thriving workplaces sustained by a stable workforce, recognizing the interconnected nature of workplace stability, recovery support, and business success. STABLE stands for "Staff Training and Business Leadership for Evolving Workplaces" and was developed through a strategic collaboration among local nonprofit organizations, workforce development agencies, and business groups.

Founding partners included MRJC's Recovery Friendly Workplaces project, AppHealthCare's trauma-informed businesses project, the Watauga Compassionate Community Initiative's family-friendly workplace policy project, OASIS's Active Bystander Intervention trainings for bars and restaurants, the Boone Area Chamber of Commerce, and more! By combining expertise from these organizations, STABLE Workplaces functions as a collaborative, one-stop resource hub that provides training, employer support, and workforce development strategies.

Our men's home opened in October 2024 and our women's home opened in January 2025. When full, our houses will accommodate 9 men and 6 women.

Both homes received accreditation from the North Carolina Association of Recovery Residences in 2024.



Programs



A partnership with the Avery County Paramedics and the Toe River Health District's Avery Campus- the Avery Recovery Vehicle is a community based initiative that involves outreach efforts to support individuals dealing with substance use.

We aim to bring services directly to people who might be facing barriers to accessing treatment, recovery resources, basic healthcare, peer support or case management.







The Avery RV helps us connect with people in neighborhoods or areas where people experiencing substance use challenges might not otherwise seek help.


COMMUNITY CARE PROGRAM

In rural communities, the majority of calls to law enforcement are not criminal in nature, but stem from challenges such as poverty, mental health, substance use, intimate partner violence, and homelessness.

The Community Care program offers a solution to these challenges by partnering social work and law enforcement.







Our work has shown that in rural areas, transportation is a lifeline to any forward mobility—and nowhere is this more evident than in Watauga County. With no detox facilities or inpatient treatment options available locally, residents seeking these critical recovery supports are often required to travel outside the county. This reality creates a significant barrier for individuals already facing the many challenges of substance use disorder.

In response, we actively work to fill the transportation gaps that prevent people from accessing the care they need.

Whether it's a ride to treatment, a court appointment, or a job interview, we're committed to getting people where they need to go—because when transportation is available, opportunity and healing become possible.

OVERDOSE AWARENESS DAY & BLACK BALLOON DAY

Black Balloon Day, observed on March 6th, is a day to honor those who have lost their lives to opioid overdoses, raising awareness about the ongoing opioid crisis and offering support to families and communities affected by addiction.





Overdose Awareness Day, observed annually on August 31, is a global event dedicated to raising awareness, reducing stigma, honoring those lost to overdose, and promoting prevention and support for those affected by substance use.




HURRICANE HELENE

A look back on updates in the immediate aftermath



For all of us, the last few weeks have been a whirlwind. The past two weeks haven't felt like the right time to post with so much going on and our collective energy going toward immediate security and relief. But through it all, we've been reminded how important it is to spread a little light and positivity, especially when things feel chaotic.



Neighbors and strangers came together to support one another, providing shelter and assistance to those in need.



As we began to assess the damage and start the recovery process, we were overwhelmed by the generosity of those who donated supplies. These items will not only help us in the immediate aftermath of the storm but will also be essential in supporting people in crisis throughout the year, ensuring their most basic needs are met.



For the last two weeks, we have been hard at work beginning the rebuilding process in the wake of Hurricane Helene. One of our new recovery homes experienced significant flooding on the bottom floor and damage to the driveway, which caused delays in completing our required steps with the Town of Boone. However, we are thrilled to announce that yesterday, October 9th, we received our certificate of occupancy for our men's recovery home! While we began accepting resident applications back in August, we are now excited to welcome individuals into the space very soon.



With this milestone achieved, we can now shift our focus to the women's house, continuing our mission to support those in need and provide a safe haven for recovery.



As we reflect on these past few weeks, we are filled with gratitude for the strength of our community and the support we've received. Each challenge has only reinforced our commitment to our mission and to one another. The journey ahead may still be uncertain, but the resilience we've witnessed reminds us that together, we can overcome any obstacle. We are excited about the future, knowing that with every step we take, we are creating spaces for healing and growth. Thank you for being part of our journey and for your continued support as we walk alongside our recovery community. Let's keep spreading hope and positivity, one message at a time!
